Wegienka Elementary Students "Look for the Good"

As part of their "Look for the Good Project", Wegienka Elementary Student Council initiated a school-wide project of emphasizing gratefulness by sharing gratitude and thankfulness on Post-It notes. Beginning in early November, Post-Its listing who and what matters in students' lives began to appear on the Gratitude Wall in the school.

Student Council Advisor Christy Schultz commented that the program coincided perfectly with the District's Anti-Bullying Campaign during October. She stated, "Instead of focusing . . . on teaching children how to deal with bullies, school leaders decided they wanted students to highlight expressing gratitude." Schultz further commented, "The program is a means to stress treating people with kindness and being grateful."

The "Look for the Good" project is a Connecticut-based nonprofit organization started in 2016 by Anne Kubitsky who began leaving self-addressed postcards of "what makes you grateful" in various public areas for people to return to her. The program eventually blossomed into a nationwide organization. According to its website, the "Look for the Good" program has serviced 120,000 children in 30 states who have written two million messages of gratitude. The program believes that "gratitude changes mindsets, reduces violence and improves everything."

Student Council members collected notes written by students each morning and placed them on the Gratitude Wall. Their goal was to have 5,000 messages posted by the

the time the program wrapped up on November 22nd.


Students also were encouraged to express their gratefulness by writing "you matter" letters to someone in their lives and then later shared the letters with the persons. Second Grade teacher Rachel Lemon's student, Aza'riah Houston, shared her letter of gratitude for Mrs. Lemon stating, "When I wanted to write good, you helped me so much."

Students also created "kindness cards" and passed them to others who were observed doing a kind deed, such as holding a door open for someone. That student initialed the card and then passed it to another student, and so on, until the card was filled with initials.

According to Schultz, "The children were on board with the project from the very beginning." She also commented, "It was wonderful to see the eagerness of the students to participate in the program" and added that "students would like to do this again next year." "Look for the Good" again in 2019!


