




SINKING FUND RENEWAL PASSES BY **OVERWHELMING NUMBERS**

On Tuesday, November 5, 2019, residents in the Woodhaven-Brownstown School District were asked to approve a sinking fund renewal to help us continue this era of excellence we have embarked upon.
